BACK TO SCHOOL APPEAL

The start of the school year has just passed, but the struggle for families on low incomes continues when faced with sending their children back to school for another year.

As the cost of uniforms, stationery and supplies increases, parents are often faced with what to prioritise when they can't afford to buy items that children need for school.

Vinnies WA financial counsellors reported an increase in calls from stressed parents in late January, concerned they could not afford school costs. These calls peak at this time of year as parents experiencing hardship are often faced with the difficult decision of either buying school supplies or putting food on the table.

The Vinnies Back to School Appeal runs each year, raising money to support people in hardship as well as directly donating school supplies. Money received through the appeal goes to being able to provide food assistance, paying bills and rent, and financial aid so parents are able to meet back to school expenses, and be able to provide a positive start to the school year. This type of practical support delivered to people in hardship, means a stable foundation can be provided for children which is vital for their development and education.

At the start of the appeal, Vinnies stocks and delivers backpacks filled with essential school supplies. The backpacks are donated from corporate groups and distributed to families in particular areas of Western Australia by Vinnies volunteers.

More than 220 donated backpacks were filled with supplies such as stationery items and pencil cases, with some of those making their way to Roebourne over 1500km from Perth. Val Walker (below left) and Kathy Brooker volunteer for Vinnies in the town and find indigenous families are often the ones who need practical support the most.

"We presented one local grandmother with four school backpacks. She is a fulltime carer to her four grandchildren and only receives a pension. You could not wipe away the smile and happiness from her face, and excitement from the kids being able to start school with their new backpacks," Val said.

In Mandurah, Jill Mather (below right) volunteers in the Vinnies Support Centre, which at the start of the

year, was able to provide school supplies and uniforms to children in and around Mandurah. As part of her volunteer work, Jill personally delivered 25 backpacks, which she says was so important for families that were really struggling to meet their daily living expenses.

"Christmas is such a difficult time for many of our Vinnies clients, and then they are faced with kids going back to school. Being able to give those families some relief with providing school items such as pens and pencils, and a new backpack really makes a difference to parents. But it also has such an impact on the kids because they can be prepared for the school year and can participate in their lessons."

Your donations through the Vinnies Back to School Appeal has helped alleviate some of the financial pressure families face at the start of the school year. It also gives children an exciting start to the school year by having vital supplies for their studies, helping to give them the best opportunity for their education.







In the middle of the WA wheatbelt region, 132km drive north east of Perth, sits the small town of Goomalling. It has a rich history and rural charm, but it is the local people that makes this town truly special.

Being a small country town, Goomalling faces many challenges, with limited job prospects and expensive food prices. There are a number of families and individuals, living in poverty with little access to local emergency relief and assistance.

The extent of Goomalling's emergency assistance used to come in the form of Father Patrick Toohey and local Indigenous elder Betty Walley, always being available to people who would knock on their front doors with requests for help. Keeping up with demand was difficult, so when Father Patrick received an email from Vinnies Membership Executive Manager Andrew York more than a year ago discussing the idea of starting up a community pantry, that all changed.

Vinnies conferences are grassroots groups that are made up from people who are passionate about helping people in their local area, and in Goomalling, establishing a new conference seemed the ideal fit so Vinnies could respond to community need by practically and financially supporting the pantry.

Once the conference was established, Vinnies was then able to start funding the project which began with Father Patrick recruiting local help. Goomalling Shire Development Officer Tahnee Bird was one of the first to join as she and Father Patrick regularly attended the local elder yarning group. It was there that Father Patrick presented the opportunity of a community pantry for the town.

At that meeting Betty Walley identified that it was the Aboriginal community that could most benefit by this venture. It was an ongoing concern for many not having access to affordable food in the town and driving to places such as Northam where prices were cheaper wasn't an option as many couldn't drive. For Tahnee, it was about what she could do to help.

"I just jumped straight on board and took it to council so that we could start collecting food and give immediate relief," she said.

Father Patrick, Tahnee and Betty were only the start, recruiting many other local residents including Louise Barker and Regina Bauer along the way, and Tahnee calling in support from a couple of her co-workers, Christine Schorer and Tina Perrin at the shire.

They initially set themselves up in a building in the centre of the main street, but it soon became evident the building didn't quite suit their needs. An offer then came from the Uniting Church which had a disused building a few streets away, and suggested the pantry could be housed there. Prisoners from the low security Dowerin Wheatbelt Work Camp helped shift the entire operation to its new location, and the pantry was up and running once again.

Goomalling's community pantry opened for business in July 2019 and has been operating every fortnight since then for local people to come, have a cup of tea, chat and receive bags of basic food items such as tea and coffee, rice and baked beans.









Food is purchased for the pantry and funded through Vinnies Emergency Assistance program and is run by Vinnies volunteers, giving their time to stock shelves, pack food bags and be there when the Pantry doors are open. Food bags given out are complimented by a regular supply of fresh produce, kindly donated from the Dowerin Wheatbelt Work Camp. Adrian Zouch, Senior Work Camp Officer at the prison said the work camp was keen to be involved when Father Patrick mentioned the project.

"Father Patrick was telling us about it. So we basically said if you want some veggies we've got plenty and we're happy to contribute. It gives the prisoners a sense of achievement to know they're doing something positive for the community."

The pantry also has the space to expand its outreach service and will soon be accommodating regular visits each fortnight from the Wheatbelt Aboriginal Health Service that will further support people who want to attend the service.

The community pantry has quickly become an important asset for the town, helping to bring both people in need of help, and people wanting to help, together in the one place. Betty Walley says, "It eases the mind of people and if they got nothing they know they can come and talk. It's just helping one another and not turning one another away. With Vinnies there, you know what I mean, that gives them confidence that somebody is there to help me."

Father Patrick adds, "Well I am proud of the fact that the pantry simply exists out of the goodwill and good hearts of many people. They really care and want people to be happy and safe and well fed and nurtured and cared for." He goes onto further say, "This is transformational for the community. It's like being yeast in the dough to raise up Goomalling to what it could be and can be."

And that is one small town with a big heart.

Receiving a letter in the mail from Vinnies more than 20 years ago has led to Rodney Laycock becoming one of our Vinnies Visionaries.

Rodney Laycock hadn't donated to a charity before when he received a letter from Vinnies asking for his support. He recalls how fortunate the timing was as he had been thinking of how he could make a difference by giving back to his community but wasn't quite sure how to go about it. That mail from Vinnies happened over twenty years ago and Rodney has been regularly donating ever since.

Today Rodney is a Vinnies Visionary, one of our regular givers who donate on a monthly basis. As a proactive donor, he shares the vision of seeing the power in how his donation helps people experiencing crisis or hardship in Western Australia.

A NEW HOME: John & Penny's Story

It was not the first time John had been referred to Vinnies Tom Fisher House, an intensive intervention service for people experiencing long term homelessness. He and his partner had accessed the service on one occasion before but this time around it was different.

He revealed to staff during his intake process that he was on his own due to his partner having just given birth in hospital to their baby. She was about to be discharged, and her immediate future was going to be back on the streets, which meant that the baby was going to be placed into care.

John's partner Penny was discharged from hospital the next day and staff advised John that she could join him at Vinnies Tom Fisher House. The couple expressed to staff that they had wanted their parenting journey to be successful and address their issues of substance dependency and relationship issues. Staff were able to build a rapport with the couple during their stay, by not excluding or judging

them because of their past challenging behaviours or drug use. They noticed John and Penny were working on their personal situation and issues and visited their baby in hospital each day.

Staff were able to help John and Penny by providing letters of support and find suitable community groups that could help with their case management and accommodation.

They also assisted the couple with developing plans to communicate with the Department of Communities so they could identify the requirements and goals they needed to meet to be able to bring their baby back into their care.

By continuing to build trust in a safe environment, Tom Fisher House staff were able to support John and Penny navigate complex systems. The couple engaged positively with the Department who advised them that if they could obtain stable and supported accommodation they could bring their baby home.



Staff were then able to extend their stay at Tom Fisher House so that the couple had time to connect with a local community group who could offer them suitable accommodation. After approval from the Department, the couple successfully transitioned into their new home with their baby and continue to make a difference to their lives by addressing their issues.
